This report, developed through an in-depth consultation process, will guide our advocacy efforts over the next two years, addressing crucial needs and challenges within palliative care across South Australia.

Aligned with our Strategic Plan 2023-26, PCSA strongly focused this year on the goal "Your Community Matters." We implemented various public education programs, increasing community participation in palliative care education. This progress reflects our commitment to deepening community understanding and engagement in palliative care.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

This past year has been transformative for Palliative Care South Australia (PCSA), marked by initiatives that strengthen our mission and broaden our impact across the state. We're building a robust identity and increased recognition through strategic programs, partnerships, and collaborations – all vital for advancing palliative care and building compassionate communities in South Australia.



In April 2024, we launched the **Palliative Care Volunteering SA** project, creating a sustainable model that shines a spotlight on Palliative Care Volunteers. Following this we successfully introduced three international programs to South

Australia: **Ambulance Wish, Last Aid,** and **TLC Connector**. These programs have enhanced our visibility significantly, reflected in a marked increase in social media engagement and community interest.

While these new initiatives have brought fresh energy to PCSA, our foundational projects remain central to our mission. Programs like **PEPA** (Program of Experience in the Palliative Approach) and **IPEPA** (Indigenous Program of Experience in the Palliative Approach), **National Palliative Care Week** activities, as well as our ongoing **membership engagement**, **networking**, and **advocacy** efforts, continue to receive focused attention and support.

Building a strong, united voice with like-minded organisations has been a key strategy in expanding our reach and impact. Highlights include:

- Palliative Care Volunteering SA Project: A formal partnership with Volunteering SA&NT, Northern Volunteering SA, and Southern Volunteering SA.
- Ambulance Wish SA Program: A collaboration with St John Ambulance SA and Flinders University.
- Compassionate Communities Conversation Series roadshow: In partnership with Carers SA, Country SA PHN, Adelaide PHN, and SA Health.

These formal partnerships enhance our programs' effectiveness and bring a holistic approach to palliative care services across South Australia.

Looking ahead to 2024-25, its likely to be another dynamic year as we advance our advocacy efforts, including our focus on the upcoming **federal election campaign**. Working in collaboration with Palliative Care Australia (PCA) and other state and territory palliative care peak bodies, we aim to secure broader national support and recognition for palliative care.

2024–26 FOR PALLIATIVE CARE PRIORITIES IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The Priorities for Palliative Care in South Australia 2024-26 were created by the sector, for the sector. These priorities were developed following a robust process of consultation. They provide direction for the sector that supports much needed transformation of South Australia's palliative care system.

The Priorities for Palliative Care in South Australia will be updated every two years and be a key guidance document for PCSA policy and advocacy activities.

People at the Heart of Palliative Care

PCSA agrees with the SA government's Palliative Care Strategic Framework 2022-2027 vision: "All South Australians, their families and carers [should] have access to and receive the best possible end of life and palliative care that places the person at the centre of care and supports them to live and die well in accordance with their individual needs, wishes, values and preferences."

Why is there a growing need for palliative care in SA?

- South Australia has one of the longest life expectancies in the world Increased longevity of South Australians contributes not only to a higher number of older people in the population, but also a change in the nature of diseases together with the time and the way that people die
- Society as a whole is still reluctant to discuss dying which is impacting outcomes People with high levels of death literacy have context specific knowledge about the death system and the ability to put that knowledge into practice
- South Australia's population is metropolitan centric
 People living in rural and remote areas have reduced access to specialist care

RAISING AWARENESS OF OUR SECTOR

National Palliative Care Week 2024



National Palliative Care Week (NPCW) 2024 was held from Sunday May 19 – Saturday May 25 with the theme 'Matters of Life and Death' - People at the Heart of Palliative Care. Together we showcased the brilliant work being achieved in palliative care across SA.

In line with the launch of our new Orange Heart national palliative care peaks branding, we displayed our 12,000 orange heart exhibition on the steps of Parliament House. The 12,000 hearts represent the number of South Australians who die each year from an expected illness. Over 250 orange hearts were added on the day, as community engaged with the heart exhibition taking a moment to reflect on people at the heart of palliative care. The Health and Wellbeing Minister Chris Picton MP visited the exhibition and Channel 10 shared the story.

The week prior we co-hosted an MP Lunchbox event at Parliament House with Volunteering SA and NT, Northern Volunteering SA and Southern Volunteering SA, to celebrate and share information about both National Volunteering Week and National Palliative Care Week. At this event we launched the Priorities for Palliative Care SA 2024-26 report.

We also hosted a Palliative Care Volunteering SA project afternoon tea, shared and showcased events, booths & displays hosted by palliative care services across the state.

National Palliative Care Week was also visible on the streets and buildings of Adelaide, as seen on SA Power Networks billboard at the end of Greenhill Road and Anzac Corner. The night skies also shone bright orange with support from Campbelltown City Council (SA) Migrant Monument, and on the River Torrens at the iconic Adelaide Oval and the majestic Adelaide Festival Centre, all 'lighting up for National Palliative Care Week'.

OUR PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS



The purpose of the Ambulance Wish SA program is simple: to give South Australians living with a lifelimiting condition access to the planning, coordination, specialist transport, photography and clinical care they need to create a memory that will last forever.

This program is led by PCSA, in collaboration with St John Ambulance SA and Flinders University. The program is supported by funding from SA Health, Corporates, Donors and Fundraisers.

In May 2024, we proudly launched the Ambulance Wish SA program, an initiative that quickly captured the hearts and attention of the community. The launch was celebrated with Simon's Ambulance Wish – an unforgettable moment where he shared a pie and a beer with his mates at the iconic Adelaide Oval. This memorable Ambulance Wish set the tone of the program and was warmly received, with coverage from all major South Australian media outlets.

The story of Simon's Ambulance Wish quickly spread, becoming "the talk of the town." It demonstrated the program's potential to bring joy and comfort, fostering a ripple of excitement and awareness across the South Australia. By the end of June, we had fulfilled three Ambulance Wishes, each one embodying our commitment to honouring Wishes for those in the last chapter of life and creating memories that last forever.

The Palliative Care Volunteering SA project strengthens palliative care volunteering across South Australia by supporting volunteers, volunteer managers, and volunteering organisations. We provide navigation, training, resources, and connections to help grow volunteers across the state. Our work also guides volunteer managers outside the palliative care service sector to incorporate palliatve care volunteer support activities into their programs.

Through webinars, events, workshops, and networking opportunities, we create spaces for shared learning and community building. With tailored resources for managers, we empower leaders to support palliative care volunteers effectively.

This project is led by PCSA, in collaboration with Volunteering SA&NT, Northern Volunteering SA and Southern Volunteering SA, and is funded by SA Health, as part of the Palliative Care Connect Program.



PEPA (Program of Experience in the Palliative Approach) provides opportunities for all health professionals to develop capabilities in providing a palliative approach to care through participation in placements, workshops and a range of learning resources. IPEPA (Indigenous Program of Experience in the Palliative Approach), provides a grassroots approach to breaking down the barriers to palliative care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples across Australia. Informed by Community for Community, IPEPA works to embed Australian First Nations knowledges across all our resources and to facilitate two-way learning.

Palliative Care SA (PCSA) thanks Queensland University of Technology (QUT) and the Department of Health and Aged Care for supporting the activities of the PEPA SA program. In addition, we thank all the SA Specialist Palliative Care Services who host the PEPA Placements and provide mentorship to the participants.

The *Compassionate Communities SA* program fosters communities where everyone recognises their role in supporting each other through serious illness, dying, death, grief, and caregiving. At its core, the program works to build death literacy, compassionate networks and environments that prioritise understanding, acceptance, and support around what many view as life's most challenging moments.

By promoting **public education**, it provides families and individuals with resources to navigate end-of-life stages with empathy and openness, helping to reduce the stigma around these topics. Through **community conversations** and **networks**, people are encouraged to discuss their experiences, normalising support for each other. The program also advises on **policy development** at all levels, ensuring caregiving and grief receive the attention they deserve. Compassionate Communities SA's awareness initiatives promote a cultural shift towards understanding the last chapter of life, encouraging individuals, communities and the health sector to come together.

In 2023-24 PCSA led the Nurturing Compassionate Communities in Country SA project, which was funded by Country SA PHN. PCSA also led the Nurturing Compassionate Communities in Adelaide project, which was funded by Adelaide PHN. These projects have enabled PCSA to expand its engagement statewide, with a particular focus on country areas, helping to ensure equitable access to program activities for all communities.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

Palli**LEARN**

PalliLEARN aims to build community knowledge, death literacy, compassion literacy and community capacity in relation to serious illness, dying, death, grief and caregiving by providing quality and easy to understand courses.

There are currently eight 60-minute courses that can be delivered online or face-to-face.

PalliLEARN is an initiative led and owned by Palliative Care South Australia, adapted locally by other Australian and International Organsiations. It focuses on providing quality and easy-to-understand courses that are accessible to all, regardless of background or experience.

Last Aid is a 4-hour international standardised introductory level community training program. On completion of the course, participants can be considered Last Aiders and part of the international Last Aid Community.

Palliative Care South Australia is the license holder for Last Aid in Australia. The first Last Aid course for South Australia was hosted in Clare on 13th May 2024.

TLC Connector – Talk. Listen. Connect.

TLC Connector training was developed in the UK. It is a basic level Connector training course relevant to everybody. The training aims to build people's skills and confidence, thereby helping them to make a difference in their community, workplace and neighbourhood.

This is a citizen activation training relevant to everybody. The course includes information on social isolation and loneliness as well as grief literacy and the importance of social connections.

TLC Connector training is an initiative created by Compassionate Communities UK. Palliative Care South Australia is the Australian lead for the program. The first TLC Connector training session in Australia was hosted on the 18th June 2024, at Adelaide Town Hall.

COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS SA Compassionate Communities Conversation Series 2023-24

Between November 2023 and January 2024, the PCSA Nurturing Compassionate Communities in SA project team undertook the SA Compassionate Communities Conversation Series initiative, inspired by a similar activity undertaken by Palliative Care Queensland in 2019.

This was hosted by PCSA, in collaboration with Carers SA and was supported by the South Australian Government, Country SA PHN and Adelaide PHN. The Hospital Research Foundation Group - Palliative Care sponsored the events. We facilitated 12 events across South Australia which brought together people from local communities to discuss and learn how they can nurture a compassionate community.

In this initiative, we met with a total of 237 South Australians, we learnt about their needs, where they find supports, what local supports are available and what strategies could be used to nurture compassionate communities in their region. This report shares those findings and identifies key focus areas for individuals, groups, organisations and decision makers in nurturing compassionate communities across SA.

The results of the conversation series were published in a report, shared throughout our networks and provide key messages for PCSA advocacy activities.
